With the Globally Harmonized System (GHS) of Classification and Labelling of Chemicals upon us, there are exclusions under WHMIS 1988/2015. They are the following:

- Explosives as defined in the Explosives Act.
- **Cosmetic, device, drug or food as defined in the Food and Drugs Act.**
- Pest control products as defined in the Pest Control Products Act.
- Consumer products as defined in the Canada Consumer Product Safety Act.
- Wood or products made of wood.
- Nuclear substances within the meaning of the Nuclear Safety and Control Act that is radioactive.
- Hazardous waste being a hazardous product that is sold for recycling or recovery and is intended for disposal.
- Tobacco and tobacco products as defined in the Tobacco Act.
- Manufactured articles.

How does this affect you?

MSDS and/or SDS are not required for cosmetic and/or DIN products related to skin care.

According to the law, SDSs belong to Workplace Hazardous Materials Systems (WHMIS/SIMDUT). These documents serve to provide information on hazardous products **that are not intended for human use.**

However, to continue to serve you better, **Avmor will be creating Safety Training Sheet (not SDS) starting January 2017.** This will replace the actual MSDS that will expire in January 2017 **specifically for skincare products.**
